Hamburg hosts legislators

Hamburg was in the spotlight on April 28th when several legislators or their staff visited the town to participate in a "Fam Tour" which was organized by Our Town Foundation and the Greater Reading Berks Development office. The purpose of the tour was to familiarize the legislators with the town, as several have been newly elected to represent the community and were not aware of the town's charm, assets and needs. When applying for grants to assist with community projects, many times letters of support are required from the legislators, so it is important that they are familiar with the town and proposed projects that may need funding in the future.

The tour started with a luncheon in the Hamburg Strand Theater party room. During the luncheon I provided a brief overview of Hamburg and how it has evolved over the past twenty years. I noted several major improvements that were made in the downtown and beyond through Our Town Foundation's efforts.

I also spoke of the value of the statewide Main Street Revitalization Programs and how significant it is to reinstate administrative funding to the programs. Twenty years ago, when Our Town Foundation was formed, funding was provided by the PA Department of Economic and Community Development to pay for Main Street Managers salaries. At one time there were over 140 successful programs throughout the state. Unfortunately, under Governor Wolf's administration the program funding was cut from over \$15 million to \$6 million and all funding for the Main Street Managers salaries was eliminated. Currently the state has less than twenty communities that are still considered as a designated Main Street community.

After seeing all the improvements made at the Hamburg Strand Theater since the Foundation purchased it ten years ago, everyone hopped on a shuttle bus to the first stop, which was the Hamburg Field House where we were greeted by Scott Thren. The legislators were enlightened to the history of the building and how it is currently used today. The Field House is owned by the Union Fire Company #1 of Hamburg and has been utilized since the 1950s to host such activities as professional wrestling and basketball, weekly dances, circuses, and so much more. The facility is in need of several renovations including new bathrooms, air conditioning, and flooring, so it can continue to be a viable option for people seeking to rent a facility of that size.

The next stop was State Street Square where the legislators were informed of the proposed community facility to be built on the lot and how it will be used to host events which will attract people to the downtown; thereby increasing the economic vitality of the town. I discussed the hurdles we have faced over the past several years including the doubling of construction costs from when we received an initial grant of \$200,000 in 2021.

From State Street Square we traveled to the Hamburg Community Park where Mayor George Holmes spoke to the group about the proposed pickelball courts to be built in the area of the tennis

courts which have been in disrepair for years. The Borough has applied for grant funding from the PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources in hopes of receiving funding to install the courts. Mayor Holmes also informed the group that the Hamburg Community Pool needs re-plastering.

The group continued on their tour to the Kernsville Dam Recreation Area where they learned about the great things Blue Mountain Wildlife, the Schuylkill River Greenways, and other groups have made to the basin. Twenty years ago, the entrance to the dam was nothing but a barren area filled with silt. It is now an ecological treasure teeming with birds, reptiles, and other wildlife. Thousands of people visit every year, many of which hike or bike the Bartram Trail, which is accessed at the parking lot area.

We were then shuttled to 215 Pine Street where the legislators got a first-hand glimpse of the ongoing redevelopment of the old industrial building that is being transformed into a beautiful new banquet hall to be named The Wherehouse of Hamburg. Dave and Kim Shefter, former owners of the Penn-Werner Hotel and Restaurant, purchased

the property two years ago and have been tirelessly working on renovating the building. They recently hosted the Hamburg Area High School's prom, the first of many events that will be held in the facility.

Our last stop was at the Art & Craft Gallery of Hamburg where everyone learned about the success of the Hamburg Area Arts Alliance and how we incorporate art and culture into the community.

A special thanks to Deb Millman and her staff from the Greater Berks Development Fund for assisting me with organizing the tour. The Alliance's staff arranged for all the legislators to attend, which is quite the task to find a day that everyone was available. According to Deb, it was a momentous day.

OTF receives 2023 Main Street America Accreditation

Our Town Foundation has been designated as an Accredited Main Street AmericaTM program for meeting rigorous performance standards. Each year, Main Street America and its partners announce the list of Accredited programs to recognize their exceptional commitment to preservation-based economic development and community revitalization through the Main Street ApproachTM.

Main Street America announced 862 Main Street programs earned the Accredited status in 2022, which is its top level of recognition.

In 2022, Main Street America programs generated \$6.2 billion in local reinvestment, helped open 7,657 net new businesses, generated 29,174 net new jobs, catalyzed the rehabilitation of 10,688 historic buildings, and leveraged 1,528,535 volunteer hours. On average, for every dollar that a Main Street program spent to support their operations, it generated \$24.07 of new investment back into Main Street communities.

Our Town Foundation's performance is annually evaluated by the PA Downtown Center, which works in partnership with Main Street America to identify the local programs that meet rigorous national performance standards. Evaluation criteria determines the communities that are building meaningful and sustainable revitalization programs and include standards such as, fostering strong public-private partnerships, supporting small and locally owned businesses, and actively preserving historic places, spaces, and cultural assets.







the building at a cost of approximately \$300,000. The grant we received from the PA Dept. of Community and Economic Development office was for \$200,000; therefore, we have kicked off a capital campaign in hopes of receiving the additional \$100,000 through community support. STATE STREET SQUARE

In 2015, Our Town Foundation purchased a one-acre THE GOAL vacant lot in downtown Hamburg with a goal of developing the property into an outdoor community hub - one where friends and families gather to enjoy

outdoor events, live performances, and cultural activities. These events will create an engaging, vibrant community thereby increasing the economic vitality of the town.

THE PLAN

Development plans include erecting an approximate 3,000 sq. ft one story structure which will have a storage area for equipment and furnishings (tables, chairs, canopies, street barricades, etc.) that are

necessary to host events. The structure will include a stage with roof cover in the front of the building. A seating area will be placed on the side of the structure. If funding permits, public restrooms will be installed as well as a kitchenette with access windows for serving food to the public. A parking lot will be constructed at the rear of the lot.

THE COST

Due to the increasing expense of building materials, the cost of the project has skyrocketed over the past few years. The initial cost of the building was estimated to be around \$200,000. The actual contractor received were over \$500.000! Therefore, the overall development will be completed in phases as funding is received. Several phases have already completed using funding from several grant sources. Our next phase is construction of the shell of the facility as well as the stage, which is estimated to cost \$350,000 Our Town Foundation has received a grant from the PA Dept. of Community and Economic Development office in the amount \$200,000 to assist with this expense: however, we must secure the additional \$150,000 before we can proceed.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

We are asking for the community's support making the State Street Development project a reality. Businesses or individuals can make a one-time donation or pledge a three-year commitment. Our goal is to secure a minimum of \$150,000 which is needed to construct the building shell and stage area. Once this phase is completely funded and built, the Foundation will focus on the next phase of the project. If for some reason the project cannot come to fruition, all donations received will be returned to the respective donor. Contributions are tax deductible to the extent permitted by law. Our Town Foundation is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization registered with the Department of State, Bureau of Charitable Organizations.




